*Heifer International/* Special Lenten Offering

The Mission Team encourages you and your family to keep a special offering this Lent. As in years past, the offering will be received after Easter and will go to *Heifer International*. Special Heifer International Offering Banks are available to be picked up from the narthex, the table outside of the church office, and the little library.

How did Heifer International begin? Here is a brief history: While passing out meager rations of powdered milk during the Spanish Civil War, Indiana farmer Dan West was distraught when the supply of milk ran out with children still waiting in line. He realized that they needed "not a cup, but a cow." Families did not need short-term relief, but a continual source of food and income. Heifer International was born from that simple idea. When they stopped fighting, we started feeding. In 1944, the first cows sent abroad were donated by West's neighbors and distributed in Puerto Rico.

But there were other wars to be won, as well. As World War II came to a haunting end, huge portions of Europe and Asia were reduced to ruins, with populations diminished, farmland demolished and hunger running rampant. Heifer became active in revitalizing these war-torn countries, including refugee resettlement centers. Groups of farmers, who dubbed themselves the Seagoing Cowboys, began escorting livestock overseas, making about 360 trips on 73 different ships.

#### PRAYER LISTS & PROTECTING PRIVACY

(This information is provided to help us all be mindful of privacy and confidentiality concerns during worship events.)

Our printed prayer lists:

Ideally, the names on this list come from the people whose names are listed. When that's not possible, close family members submit the requests. Third-party requests are listed only if permission has been given by the person whose name is to be listed. Our worship services are live streamed on Facebook. Names and circumstances spoken aloud can be heard on live-stream, and this information is out there to be shared over and over for an indefinite amount of time.

As a family of faith who comes together, virtually and inperson, every Sunday to worship and to lift one another up in prayer and share faith testimonies, it is not our intent to violate anyone's privacy.

So, how do we navigate *privacy* in public worship? Brotherhood Mutual (our insurance company) recently published *Prayer Lists: How to Protect Privacy*.

In part, it reads:

#### Obtain Permission before Sharing Sensitive Information

Sweeping changes to privacy laws have changed the way doctors, hospitals, and even insurance companies handle health care information. Part of the <u>Health Insurance Portability and</u> <u>Accountability Act</u> (HIPAA) that took effect in 2003 made it illegal for health care providers to disclose information about a person's medical condition. Generally, the Act doesn't pertain to churches. However, the ensuing discussion of privacy rights has led many churches to reexamine how they share personal information through prayer ministries.

Here are some suggestions on how to maintain a prayer ministry without offending the prayer recipient or breaking the law.

#### Get Consent

There's nothing that prevents a person from telling the congregation—or the whole world that he has a medical condition and would like prayer. But some laws prevent you from telling the world for him. Therefore, it's a good idea to obtain a person's consent before disclosing personal information. It could be as simple as asking someone: "Would you like us to add you to the prayer list?" or "Would you mind if we shared this information with the congregation?" It's easiest to get verbal consent, but you have far greater legal protection if you obtain it in writing.

#### Keep it Simple.

Even with a person's consent, it's best to keep the information general. A notice that says "Sue Smith has been hospitalized, and we pray for a speedy recovery" is better than "Sue Smith has been suffering from debilitating panic attacks that have caused her to be admitted to the hospital. Please pray for her."

#### Defer to a Spokesperson

Some churches avoid the problem of obtaining consent by printing information on how to reach a relative or close friend who has agreed to serve as spokesperson. The spokesperson can decide how much detail to release, and to whom. That person is probably in a better position than the church to know how much information to share.

Hopefully this information will help us all be more attentive to privacy concerns as we worship together.

# **STEWARDSHIP REPORT**

### **Budget Results for January 2023**

For the month of January, 2023, the Church Budget received \$37,976.69 more than it spent. For the year, the Church Budget received \$37,976.69 more than it spent.

<u>Major Maintenance & Repair Fund</u> – this designated money will be used to pay for major maintenance or repair projects to the Church building, parsonage or parking lot. The Board of Trustees must recommend all expenditures from this fund to the Church Council, and the Church Council must approve all expenditures from this fund. This is a perpetual fund and a minimum balance of \$2,500.00 shall be maintained at all times. \$73,837.78 MM&RF Money Available January 31, 2023

<u>Other Designated Gifts</u> – occurs when the Church receives money for a designated purpose and the Church shall only spend this money for the purpose that it was given.

#### \$101,800.00 Perpetual Care Cemetery Fund

In order to plan and provide the necessary funds for the care and upkeep of our cemetery, a Perpetual Care Cemetery Fund was created. This fund was a non-expendable trust fund in which the principal (donations) cannot be spent but the interest earned on the principal can be spent for the care and upkeep of the cemetery. The Perpetual Care Cemetery Fund was capped as of January 17, 2016 by the Church Council and is no longer taking donations.

#### \$50,091.75 Helen Grady Endowment Fund

The money was donated to our church from the estate of Helen Grady in 2007 to be used for improvements to the church, community, or the development of an individual. The money is at the United Methodist Foundation of WNC, Inc. and the amount that can be spent annually is 5% of the last three (3) years average end-of-year balance.
